## With Garfield Heights City Schools Treasurer and Business Director Allen Sluka

#### Interested in the Strategic Planning Process? Get Involved!

The Garfield Heights City Schools will be engaging in a very meaningful Strategic Planning process that will establish a clear path forward for the District for the next 3 to 5 years. While any school district will take time to create an appropriate educational vision for the future to ensure student growth and achievement, one additional set of priorities will revolve around finances and facilities. For this edition of the Treasurer's Report, an elaboration of what the community can expect from this aspect of the strategic planning process will be outlined. Anyone who is interested in participating on the Finances and Facilities Committee should plan on attending the kick-off Strategic Planning meeting on Thursday, February 20, 2020 from 5 – 7 p.m.

#### **Financial Decisions Over the Next 5 Years**

Fiscal stability and prudent use of resources ensures that our students receive the best public education the District can offer. Given the current political and socioeconomic climate, a close watch on tax dollars combined with state resources must be adhered to. How the District spends its money, and on what programming, services and resources the District invests its dollars will be part of the Strategic Planning discussion over the next several months. Even prior to the mention of the strategic planning initiative, the Finance Office was deliberatively adhering to strict planning principles. As the community knows, the District is required by Ohio Revised Code to submit 5-year financial forecasts to the State of Ohio twice each year. This forward-thinking best management practice compels our Board of Education and Administration to be plan-oriented all the time. In addition to this, a 5-Year Capital Maintenance program was adopted by the Board of Education last fall as another internal control to force financial decisions to be deliberate and planned. The Strategic Planning focus for the District's finances will attempt to fine tune what has already been achieved, where the entire staff has experienced educational and co-curricular success while still doing more with less.

#### Facilities Assessment for Those Aspects of our District in Disrepair and Need

While many of the facilities in our District have experienced relatively newer renovations, some of our buildings and facilities need to be strongly assessed for their continued sustainability in serving students. The Middle School, currently, has reached capacity with HVAC systems, electrical grid and plumbing that virtually render upgrades or enhancements impossible. The windows require replacement and the roof continues to be patched with band-aid fixes that are not long-term solutions. Serious assessment of the future viability of this building is in order, and will be a topic of great consideration during the Strategic Planning process. So too will be our High School and Middle School athletic facilities and amenities. The needs at our varsity football and soccer field along with the track persist and will not improve without a sizeable investment. The facilities limit opportunities for our students, and do not represent the quality of amenities serving other students at various ages in our District. We need your help to determine how viable an upgrade can be with the community's support.

Once again, if you are interested in the topics outlined in this article, we ask for your help. Please attend the Strategic Planning kickoff meeting on Thursday, February 20, 2020 and register to be part of the Finances and Facilities subcommittee. Your help will be greatly appreciated.

All Five Buildings in Garfield Heights City Schools Earn Positive Behavior Honors from the State of Ohio

All five buildings in the Garfield Heights City Schools, the High School, Middle School, Elmwood Elementary, Maple Leaf Elementary and William Foster Elementary, earned statewide honors for their high achievement and dedication to Positive Behavior Intervention Supports (P.B.I.S.). Superintendent Chris Hanke received the honors at the Ohio P.B.I.S. Awards Showcase held in Dayton, Ohio, late last year. The Ohio P.B.I.S. Showcase recognized schools for their quality P.B.I.S. implementation during the past year. Assistant Superintendent Sean Patton has played a lead role in developing the District's dedication to P.B.I.S. for many years. According to Mr. Patton, "The Garfield Heights City Schools has made a priority of combining the importance of academics along with behavior, and we are pleased to have been recognized by the state for this commitment." Specifically, William Foster Elementary School earned a Silver Award from the State of Ohio, making this the fourth consecutive year of such behavior achievement. The High School, Middle School, Elmwood and Maple Leaf Elementary School each won a Bronze Award from the State of Ohio. The entire school district has earned this high honor and deserves a round of applause. #### **Bucket Drummers Becoming Exposed to Performing Arts Program in District**

Sixth, seventh and eighth grade students at Garfield Heights Middle School have been presented with a creative performing arts opportunity that may very well serve as an initial exposure to the successful musical and band programs in our District. Called the Bucket Drummers, approximately 15 middle school students meet every Monday after school to introduce themselves to learning the nuances of drumming on buckets. Led by advisor Brett Balika, this "starter session" for students emerged after the considerable interest in percussion but not enough drums in the formal Middle School band. "Our hope is that students will begin to read music and establish an alternate path for music in a creative and fun way," said Mr. Balika. The Bucket Drummers had top billing at a recent Board of Education meeting that took place in the Middle School cafeteria and also at Family Engagement Night that was held earlier this fall. "Garfield Heights Middle School is all about providing meaningful opportunities to our students," said Building Principal Mr. Chris Sauer.
